# Park History

Formerly known as Innsbruck USA, Aqua-Terra was a popular skiing destination throughout the 1960s and 1970s with 1200 vertical feet of ski trails, and 15 active trails and 3 lifts.

Broome County took the park over in 1983 and has protected it from development and created a great place for families and the community.



## Flora/Fauna

Aqua-Terra Park is home to many species of plants. Trees such as Hemlock, Oak, Beech, Red and White Pine thrive besides Cinnamon and Ostrich ferns. Blackberries also grow in the area. However, be very cautious; do not eat the berries, they may be the wrong kind!

Animals inhabit the area as well—beavers being the most active. Deer, rabbits, foxes, and songbirds are also seen in the park.



## Legend

#### Lake Trail (Red)

#### 1.1 miles:

Trail starts on the right side of the lake and follows the path counter-clockwise around the lake ending on the dam. The dam can be slippery in the fall and spring.

#### Hartley Way (Blue)

0.75 miles;

Trail starts on the far side of the dam from the entrance. It loops around to the red trail and has some good elevation gain. The trail partially walks the perimeter of the park.

#### Innsbruck Loop (Yellow)

#### 2.1 miles;

This trail follows the perimeter of the Innsbruck ski area and has a significant elevation gain. This trail starts on the left side of Aqua-Terra park near the parking area. You will have to cross a stream to get to the mountain, and hiking the elevation can be rigorous in the spring and winter.
